STATUS AND NATURE OF OPERATIONS

GRACE ASSOCIATION is registered under section 42 of the Companies Act 2017 on 26th February 2007 bearing Registration No. 0059653 (Old No. 6320/20070201). The registered office of the company is located at Plot No. 27-E, Suite No. 5, 3rd floor, Ali Plaza, Fazai-ul-Haq Road, Blue Area, Islamabad. The object for which the company has been formed and registered is to promote quality education for all children through secondary and beyond, early childhood care and development and promoting peace and development at the grassroots level.

The Association has a commitment to strengthen human and institutional development through awareness raising, capacity building training, partnerships building and networking to enhance access of poor and disadvantage communities to safe drinking water & sanitation, irrigation water, English language, employability and soft life skills and livelihood opportunities for poorest of the poor such as people with disabilities and women in particular. The major source of funding available to the Association is receipts from the local project communities in kinds and voluntary service contributions, GRACF member contributions and English Access Microscholarships Grants from US Embassy Islamabad and small grants for supporting vulnerable children primary education from Global Fund for Children aiming at providing English language and academic improvement opportunities for adolescents from disadvantaged families in Gilgit-Baltistan and economically very poor communities such as Bari I mam in the suburb of Islamabad.

GRACE ASSOCIATION also did a remarkable project entitled K-2 cleanup project in collaboration with the US Embassy, local volunteers and esteemed guests visitors from China and Tajikistan aiming at attaining the Sustainable Development Goals 15 (Life on Land) by raising awareness in local communities and tourists on needs and importance of keeping the environment clean through cleaning the K2 Basecamp area and valages there by collecting the solid wastes especially plastic bags and demonstrating their safe disposal in fiscal year 2017-18. GRACE ASSOCIATION also received funds from the Canadian Evaluation Society which was specifically used by the company for the evaluation and monitoring, workshop conference in the current fiscal year 2018-19.

BRIEF SUMMARY OF PERFORMANCE AND INTERNAL CONTROLS

Income from donarions' grants of the company has gradually increased which resulted in a Gross Surplus of Rs. 2.811,161 as compared to last year which resulted in a Gross deficit of (Rs. 307,007); whereas the company's financial performance has shown promising impacts which lead to a Surplus after taxation of Rv. 3.490,253 as compared to last year which resulted in a Deficit after taxation of (Rs. 1,211,363). The eported deficit in the fiscal year 17-18 was due to the timing difference as activity on projects whose already under way and the funds for those projects were received after the year end. The grants can't be accrued unless all the conditions associated with the grants are met thus the timing difference sometimes may result in a deficit. This ultimately had an impact on the Gross Surplus for the current fiscal year of 18-19 as the costs incurred on projects for the previous period were booked in the previous period as compared to the funds for those projects which were received in the current fiscal year.

In addition to this, the other income for the current year also rose significantly due to the exchange gain on the programs. The funds for the English Access Program and English Works Program were agreed and funded in dollars i.e. USD currency and during the current fiscal year 18-19, the major devaluation of PKR currency against the USD currency lead to such increase in the other income along with Surplus after taxation.

The company performs its operation in specified programs and areas which are mainly related to education. These programs and projects receive funds from the foreign and local donors. The funds from the donors are received directly through the banking channels to ensure complete documentation. These projects and programs are mainly supervised, monitored and executed by the management of the company who monitor every aspect of the activity taking place. Therefore, the internal controls of the entity currently ensure that the chances of material misstatements are almost non-existent.

FUTURE PLANS:

GRACE ASSOCIATION plans to continue its community development projects and programs expecially health, English Access Microscholarship Program, English Works program, employability and skills enrichment activities and educational programs for children and adolescents from economically disadvantaged communities through advocacy, networking, partnerships building and profing resources from national and international supporting organizations and donors.

The Association mair, target for the next year is to expand its educational projects to more people and communities in needs in the country particularly scaling up its girl's education programs by providing access to education to the most marginalized and excluded groups especially girl children at grassroots level and children with disabilities in the least developed parts in the country.

The improvements in the internal control system have been continuously suggested time to time by the auditors but we feel that the cost of maintenance of such controls is too much high and costly and

it is unaffordable for the entity right now. However, we feel confident that with the current design of the entity and with the current funding from the donors gradually increasing, GRACE ASSOCIATION will be able to design and implement internal controls deemed necessary for the operations in the upcoming years.

1 STATUS AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

The Grassroots Association for Community Empowerment (GRACE) is a not-for-profit organization (NPO), registered under Companies Act 2017 with the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP). The company head office is registered at 27 - E 3rd Floor, Office 5, Ali Plaza, Fazal-e-Haq Road, Blue Area Islamabad Pakistan. The GRACE was developing out of an indigenous grassroots children's campaign for education in 1992, GRACE contributions have expanded from education and health to issues related to the Environment, Natural Resource Management (NRM), Water Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) and Livelihoods. Also, target communities have expanded from those in a single, remote village in Baltistan to encompass the entire country. The SECP license issued to the company is valid upto May 30,2021

2 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Accounting convention

These accounts have prepared under the historical cost convention .All transctions have been accounted for on accural basis except for cash flow information.

2.2 Statement of Compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with approved accounting standards, as applicable in Pakistan. Approved accounting and reporting standards comprise of international Financial Reporting Standards for the small sized entities issued by international accounting standard board as notified under the Companies Act 2017 and the accounting standard for not for profit organizations as issued by Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan as notified under the Companies Act 2017 and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017. Where provision of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017 differ from the IFRS for SMEs or the accounting standard for NPO's, the provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017 have been followed.

2.3 Taxation

The activities of foundation are exempt from the operation of provisions of tax but specific exemption is in process and still has not been granted to the foundation.

2.4 Property, plant and equipment

Every item which has useful life of more then one year has been stated in fixed asset. Fixed asset are stated at cost less depreciation, with full year depreciation has been charged on addition.

Depreciation is charged on straight line method so as to write off the written down value of the assets over their estimated useful lives at rates.

Any profit or loss on disposal is calculated on the basis of written down value of fixed assets and is recognized in the current year profit or loss.

2.5 Grants and Grants recognition

Donation includes amount received locally as well as foreign, furthermore GRACE Association, Pakistan coordinates nationwide membership contributions, membership fees, revenue generating and signature events to raise funding and awareness for our programes. Grants are recognized on receipt basis, however if the company is enable to meet the conditions of any grant, it is kept as liability of the company until the conditions of grant are met.
